Re: Delinquent Dues

Complaint was received by the Board of Directors that there are, at the present time, a number of members who are in arrears in the payment of their dues, locker fees, etc. A further complaint was received that some delinquent members are availing themselves of the facilities of the Club to the exclusion of members in good standing.

Both matters were discussed at great length and as a result the Board of Directors directed that the proposed changes in Sections 30 and 31 of the Club's By-laws pertaining to the payment of dues, etc. be posted on the bulletin board of the boathouse for two weeks and then to be acted on at a special membership meeting on Thursday, Sept. 6, 1962, at 8:00 p.m. If the recommendations of the Board are concurred in they will be thereafter strictly enforced.

"Section 30. Any member who owes FOLKER (six) months dues is thereby automatically expelled. This provision shall not become effective until the delinquent member has been duly notified by registered letter sent to his last known address 30 days prior to the effective date of his expulsion. To rejoin he must: fill out a new application, pay initiation fee (and defense tax), pay new locker fee, and pay back dues.

"Section 31. Any member who shall become indebted to the Club in the sum of Six Dollars (\$6.00) or more for dues, LOCKER FEES, fines, or assessments, SHALL BE SUSPENDED FROM ALL PRIVILEGES OF THE CLUB and shall have his name posted on a bulletin board for that purpose in a conspicuous place in the boathouse of the Club."
